

Monday Morning Report

INTERNAL

<u>COVID-19 UPDATE</u>: Global confirmed cases reached 207,348,828 this morning (up 7 million since last week), with 4,365,505 deaths. US cases are at 36,680,287, with 621,636 deaths (8/16/21). (*Johns Hopkins*). Texas was reporting 2,808,388 cases yesterday with 53,091 deaths, including **Bexar County**: 212,968 cases with 3,770 deaths; **Guadalupe County**: 13,658 cases, with 233 deaths; **Comal County**: 7,705 cases with 332 deaths; **Hays County**: 22,689 cases with 243 deaths; **Travis County**: 95,054 cases with 1,075 deaths; and **Williamson County**: 47,068 cases with 507 deaths (8/15/21). (*TDHHS*).

INFRASTRUCTURE

The US Senate in **Washington** approved \$66 billion in funding for expansions of Amtrak passenger rail services last week, but the money is just part of the battle ahead. As recent efforts to restore service along the **Gulf Coast** demonstrate, resistance from the freight railroads to more passenger service is going to pose major legal and regulatory challenges. The root question is which should have priority, people or freight? **Story**.

The **Gulf Coast** is not the only region trying to provide new passenger rail service (above): After years of lying dormant, commuter rail plans are drawing new attention to other routes in Texas, including between **Austin-San Antonio** and the cities in between (**here**). There are a lot hurdles to overcome before Amtrak service can be expanded, including Union Pacific resistance, matching funding, and, oddly, TxDOT itself. **Story**.

Texas Government Insider reports that Texas stands to receive \$26.9 billion in highway funding from the infrastructure spending bill passed by the US Senate last week, based upon previous formula funding allocations, and \$537 million for bridge replacements and repairs over five years. The state can also compete for portions of another \$12.5 billion for economically important bridges and \$16 billion for projects of national significance. **Story**.

TxDOT is holding a public 'Open Comment' period on design aspects of the IH-35 Central Expressway through downtown **Austin** from August 10 to September 8th. For more information on the project visit the website (*here*) or participate by emailing your comments to **capexcentral@txdot.gov**.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT (and Other News)

Rapid population growth along the **Austin-San Antonio Corridor** has come to the attention of the **New York** *Times*, which singled the region out for separate coverage last week in a wrap-up of 2020 Census Bureau data and referred to the growth rate in a headline as 'mind-blowing.' **New Braunfels** drew notice for a 44% population expansion and Kyle mayor **Travis Mitchell** is quoted: 'With growth come extreme challenges.' *Story*.

With three straight months of spectacular US jobs numbers and the stock market at all-time highs, the **Dallas Morning News** said over the weekend that the nation is poised for a 'blockbuster' fall economically but warns that spiking COVID-19 numbers could derail one of the fastest and broadest economic recoveries on record. **Story**.

<u>Elon Musk Watch</u>: Various media outlets are reporting that Elon Musk's The Boring Company is exploring a tunneling project from **Austin** to Bergstrom International Airport. Others say the company is looking at an **Austin-San Antonio** underground hyperloop connection. Still others have the company involved in Capital Metro's Project Connect or a **Dallas-Fort Worth** tunnel WITH a hyperloop. We're taking a wait-and-see. **Sample**.
