

# Monday Morning Report

January 31, 2022

#### **INTERNAL**

<u>COVID-19 UPDATE</u>: Global cases reached 375.3 million this morning, with 5,665,683 million deaths. US cases are at 74.3 million with 884.265 deaths. (1/31/22) (**Johns Hopkins**). Yesterday, Texas was reporting 5,158,709 confirmed cases with 78,136 deaths, including in **Bexar County**: 430,251 cases with 5,540 deaths; **Guadalupe County**: 24,691 cases, with 357 deaths; **County**: 20,080 cases, with 498 deaths; **Hays County**: 48,827 cases with 387 deaths; **Travis County**: 191,887 cases with 1,562 deaths; and **Williamson County**: 102,198 cases with 792 deaths (1/30/22). ### **INFRASTRUCTURE**

The US Department of Transportation in **Washington** announced last week the largest highway safety initiative in decades, earmarking \$6 billion to reduce traffic fatalities, improve medical emergency care, impose collision-avoidance technologies, lower traffic speeds, and re-design highways to incorporate safer conditions for bicyclists and pedestrians. "Only zero deaths is acceptable," said Secretary Pete Buttigieg. **Story. More.** 

TxDOT is predicting a record funding level of \$80 billion available for the agency's 2023 Unified Transportation Plan, up nearly \$10 billion over 2022 and largely stemming from increased Federal dollars flowing from the recently passed Biden administration infrastructure spending bill. **Staff Presentation**.

**San Antonio** city officials seemed stunned last week by a TxDOT decision to unilaterally reverse a seven-year-old agreement that would have removed 2.2 miles of Broadway Street from state control and returned it to local jurisdiction, calling the move 'illogical' and 'unnecessary.' At issue may be a local redevelopment plan to reduce the number of traffic lanes to accommodate bikes and pedestrians. **Story**. **Opinion**. **More Opinion**.

TxDOT unveiled more details of its re-designed plans for IH-35 through downtown **Austin** in two public presentations last week, including lowered main lanes from Ben White to US 290 East, prospective \$700-800 million parkland 'caps' to be paid for by the city, and both north and southbound frontage lanes positioned side-by-side between Caesar Chavez and Dean Keeton streets. Design drawings accompany the story. **Details. More**.

**Leander** will let the local voters decide whether to remain in Capital Metro despite receiving a series of olive branches and infrastructure funding comprises from the **Austin-**area transit agency. An election is scheduled for May 7. **Story**. **More**.

A sprawling 36-hour traffic jam earlier this month on the East Coast's busiest highway, I-95, was the result of political paralysis, miscommunication, and a failure to grasp the severity of the situation, according to a tick-tock timeline report from the **Washington** *Post* that reads like a network television thriller. A cautionary tale for transportation planners everywhere. *Story*.

**Austin** Bergstrom International Airport is reaching out to potential vendors for expansions of utility and airfield infrastructure with an online session on upcoming contracting opportunities Feb. 10, from 5:30-6:30 pm, and an engineering design Request for Qualifications will be released *today* (1/31) for the south airport area. **Details**.
