

Monday Morning Report

March 25, 2024

INTERNAL

The Executive Committee of the **Austin-San Antonio** Corridor Council met last week via Zoom for a presentation on an upcoming federally funded climate-water-and-energy study of The Corridor by Dr. Soe Myint and nine colleagues spearheaded by Texas State University. Also on the agenda: regional population updates, latest EV-adoption numbers, area highway improvements, and new developments with high-speed rail. *Final Agenda*.

INFRASTRUCTURE

They're calling it 'Day Zero,' the point at which sometime this June **Mexico City** - home to 21 million people - will run out of water. **Axios** says the growing scarcity of water - the capital city is already rationing - in parts of Mexico is a bellwether of how worsening climate change may affect cities all over the world. Meanwhile, the nation's farmlands are running out of workers, as croppicking migrants age or stream north to the US. **Story. More**.

It feels a little like that Y2K scare that never materialized but officials are warning about massive traffic jams along the route of April 8th's solar eclipse 'path of totality,' which includes the **Austin-San Antonio Corridor**. A similar event in 2017 caused 15-hour traffic jams in some rural areas, the **Washington** *Post* reports *here*.

People in the US travel an average of 42 miles daily, according to a new study from mobility analytics firm Replica that looked at all modes including personal automobiles, public transit, walking, biking, and more. **Travis County** averaged 23.2 vehicle miles traveled per person; **Bexar County**, 22.9 per person. **Story**. **Data Set**.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT (and Other News)

A \$1.3 billion data center has cleared preliminary hurdles for a 206-acre campus in **Caldwell County**, 10-miles east of **San Marcos** and about 3-miles northwest of **Lockhart**, officials told the **Express-News** last week. National developer Prime Data Centers is the, well, prime mover behind the project. **Story**.

A fast-growing Swiss climate-tech company has chosen **Austin** as the site for its US headquarters. Climeworks, based in **Zurich**, specializes in direct air-capture carbon removal using giant turbines, chemicals, and minerals to remove carbon from the atmosphere and store it underground. **Story**.

Climate change is already putting pressure on the economic, political, and social fabric of the US, the **Brookings** Institute reports, but that change is just the start: a new study of the Great

Migration of Black Americans from the south to the north points out how dramatically climate migration could affect the country soon. *Study*.

The **San Antonio** *Express-News* reports that recent **Boca Chica** rocket launches by SpaceX have also launched a 'branding race' among **South Texas** towns hoping to cash-in on space-related tourism and prompting **Brownsville** to adopt the moniker '*Newspace City.*' As if *Starbase* wasn't bad enough. *Story*.

<u>Just For Fun:</u> A longtime friend of the Corridor Council sent us this **video** of a Chinese Rapid Transit train that apparently operates without tracks or overhead wires but follows a buried fixed guide-way system. And since we're thinking big about the future, why not trains on the moon? NASA contractor Northrup Grumman is already eyeing a transit project for a lunar colony. *Earth First.* **Story**.
